THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO JOHN

INTRODUCTION

The Synoptics (Matthew, Mark, Luke) record the historical facts of the life of Jesus, while the Gospel according to John gives the theological and spiritual interpretation of these facts. However, each one of the Gospels presents a particular aspect of the life of our Lord.

Matthew emphasizes the royalty of Jesus and presents Him as King of the Jews and their long-awaited Messiah. *"Behold a king shall reign in righteousness."* Isaiah 32:1.

Mark omits the geneology of Jesus and begins immediately with His public ministry. He presents Jesus as the mighty Servant of Jehovah. *"Behold my Servant whom I uphold."* Isaiah 42:1.

Luke gives a more detailed account of His geneology, birth, childhood, adolescence and adulthood. He presents Jesus as the perfect Man who experiences human life, a man among men, the Mediator between God and men. *"Behold a Man of sorrows and acquainted with grief."* Isaiah 53:3.

John presents Christ as the eternal Word of God, who was made flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth. (John 1:14). John, like Mark, omits the geneology of Jesus, goes back into eternity and begins his Gospel by saying, *"In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God and the Word was God. All things were made by Him and without Him was not anything made that was made."* John 1:1-3. He is eternal, co-existing with God and co-Creator of all things (Genesis 1:1). All the way through his Gospel, John demonstrates that Christ is God. *"Behold your God!"* Isaiah 40:9. In John's Gospel, Jesus is revealed as the Son of God, even before His incarnation (John 1:1-14). He is revealed as the Son of God by His miracles and His words (1:15-12:50). He reveals Himself as the Son of God to His disciples. (Chapters 13-17).

He is revealed as the Son of God by His crucifixion. (Chapters 18-19; see also Psalm 22 and Isaiah 53). Finally, by His resurrection, once and for all, He established the fact that He is the Son of God. (Chapters 20-21; see also Romans 1:4).

The key verse of John's Gospel is Chapter 20:31. "but these are written, that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in His name." Here, then, is the great theme of the Gospel: JESUS CHRIST, THE SON OF GOD, GIVES ETERNAL LIFE TO THOSE WHO BELIEVE IN HIM.

We have chosen Chapter 16:28 for an outline of our study.



NOTE: *"The word became flesh and dwelt among us"* can be translated from the Greek and read *"*The word became flesh and set up a tabernacle among us." The tabernacle in the Old Testament was a symbol of God's presence among the Israelites and His glory was seen by them. So Christ, in a human body, manifested, in every sphere of His life, of His personality, of His ministry, the glory of God, the Father. When His disciples asked Him to show them the Father, Jesus answered them very simply, *"He who has seen Me has seen the Father."* (John 14:9).
